INTRODUCTION

By October 1st of each calendar year, California University of Management and Sciences (CALUMS) publishes its Annual Campus Security Report including important information about safety and security policies implemented to protect the welfare of our campus community, as well as crime statistics for the campus.

This report is being issued in accordance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act of 1998 ("Clery Act"), Section 485 of the Higher Education Act (HEA), and the California Education Code, Sections 67380-67385.

CALUMS is committed to protecting the safety and security of all students, staff, and faculty, as well as visitors to our campus, and to providing accurate and complete information regarding crimes committed in the campus community. We believe that our policies and programs for preventing and reducing crime, and our emergency notices, timely warnings and disclosure of crimes reported, promote a safer, more informed community.

The publication of this Annual Security Report (ASR) is intended for the information of all currently enrolled and prospective students and employees of CALUMS.

HOW TO REPORT CRIMES AND OTHER DANGEROUS SITUATIONS

- 1. The Anaheim Police Department has primary jurisdiction over the CALUMS campus.
- All crimes occurring on campus must be reported immediately to the Anaheim Police
 Department at the contact telephone numbers shown below. The University strongly
 encourages victims to report immediately all incidents and/or any suspicious activity to
 the Anaheim Police Department any time of the day or night.

TIP: Program the above telephone numbers as a one-touch number on your phone (if you dial 9-1-1 from some cell phones it may take longer to connect your call and determine your location).

- 4. When you dial 9-1-1 from a land-line phone or use a yellow emergency telephone, the dispatcher or operator can locate the phone from which you are calling and will dispatch a police officer.
- 5. If there is a fire and no telephone is available, activate one of the fire alarms located throughout campus.
- 6. Confidential Reporting Procedures. If victims do not wish to file a police report, they or others acting on their behalf can report crimes anonymously and confidentially to the Administration Office. No names will be taken and no criminal investigation will be conducted, but the report will be included in the crime statistics reported in the annual Campus Security Report.
- 7. Reporting Hate Crimes. A hate crime is any criminal act or attempted criminal act directed against a person(s), public agency or private institution based on the victim's actual or perceived race, nationality, religion, sexual orientation, disability, or gender or because the agency or institution is identified or associated with a person or group of an identifiable race, nationality, religion, sexual orientation, disability, or gender.

A hate crime includes an act that results in injury, however slight; a verbal threat of violence that apparently can be carried out; an act that results in property damage; and property damage or other criminal act(s) directed against a private or public agency.

Crimes routinely classified as misdemeanors can be felonies if committed because of bigotry. A conviction cannot be based on speech alone, unless the speech itself threatens violence against a specific individual or group, and the defendant has the ability to carry out the threat.

If you are the victim of or witness a hate crime, report it as soon as possible to the Anaheim Police Department at 714-765-1900.

HOW THE SCHOOL RESPONDS TO CRIMES AND EMERGENCIES

- CALUMS utilizes a mass email application called *Mail Chimp*. This application has the ability to send mass emails to students, faculty, and staff during emergencies. The application provides faculty, staff and students with timely information and instructions during emergencies or other urgent situations that may directly affect their well-being.
- 2. In an emergency, the CALUMS Student Services Advisor is authorized to verify and determine the content of the message, and use the application to send the alerts to all students, faculty, and staff.
- 3. The alert messages are sent based on the email information listed in the student, faculty, and staff database.
- 4. Students, faculty, and staff are responsible in making sure that their email addresses are updated in the school's database.

- 6. In an emergency, CALUMS will, without delay, and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of responsible authorities, compromise efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to or otherwise mitigate the emergency.
- 7. The Office of Student Services uses the above application to broadcast an immediate threat to the campus community. This notification is made as soon as possible. The Administration Office also promptly posts any incident of criminal activity that poses a potential serious or continuing threat to the campus at the campus bulletin boards.

HOW TO REPORT SEXUAL ASSAULT CASES

- 1. Report sexual assaults as soon as possible.
- 2. You may make an informal confidential report and forward it to the Office of Student Services in person, by phone call, or email.
- 3 . You have the right to make a formal criminal report to the Anaheim Police Department. The Student Services Office can assist you in notifying the Anaheim Police Department regarding your case.

- 4. If you request a police response after an on-campus assault, the Student Services Office staff will explain the police and possible medical procedures, and, with your consent, may transport you to the nearest hospital equipped to perform evidentiary medical exams. The decision whether or not to participate in the criminal justice process can be made later, but evidence must be collected promptly or it is lost.
- 5. Physical evidence should be collected within 72 hours of the assault, and only at a certified medical facility, upon request of a law enforcement agency. To preserve evidence, you should not change clothes, bathe or shower, brush your teeth or use mouth wash, comb your hair, or take other action to clean up before going to the hospital. If you feel you may have been administered drugs to facilitate an assault, it is best to wait to urinate until you reach the hospital and a urine sample can be collected. A police officer will accompany you to the exam.
- 6. You should seek immediate medical attention whether or not you report the incident to the police, even if you do not feel you have been seriously injured. A medical examination is important to check for sexually transmitted diseases or other infection/injuries, and for pregnancy. A Student Services staff can assist you in finding the appropriate medical provider, whether you do or do not have insurance.

HOW TO REPORT SUSPECTED MISCONDUCT BY STUDENTS, STAFF, OR FACULTY

- 1. If those suspected of committing a crime are CALUMS students, staff or faculty, you may, in addition to filing a police report, report the suspected misconduct for possible disciplinary action.
- 2. To report suspected misconduct by a CALUMS student, call or email the Office of Student Services at 714-533-3946 or ssa@calums.edu.
- 3. The CALUMS Code of Student Conduct prohibits physical assault, including sexual assault; threats of violence; and conduct that threatens health or safety, sexual harassment; stalking; illegal use or possession of weapons, explosives, drugs or alcohol; theft; vandalism; misuse of computer resources; and other crimes and misconduct. Students who commit crimes may be prosecuted criminally as well as disciplined by the campus. Students and student organizations may be disciplined for off-campus conduct that threatens health, safety or security.
- 4. The grievance procedures stipulated in the Student Handbook shall thereafter be applied for those involving student, staff and faculty.

PUBLIC INFORMATION REGARDING SEX OFFENDERS

The State of California requires sex offenders to register with the police in the jurisdiction in which they reside, as well as with campus police departments if they are a student, working or carrying on a vocation on campus.

SAFETY AND SECURITY OF CAMPUS FACILITIES

Providing safety and security to the campus community is a continuous process of reevaluating existing policies, facilities, and practices so that they conform to the changing needs of the community and reduce or eliminate hazards.

- 1. CALUMS has contracted campus security personnel to ensure the safety of the life and property of students, faculty, staff, and visitors.
- 2. Security surveillance cameras have been installed inside and outside the campus building to monitor the ingress, egress, and regress of persons or individuals and likewise to serve as evidentiary material to crimes or such other activities which would be found helpful for resolution of the case/s.
- 3. Since the campus is open from Mondays through Saturdays, other persons could access the buildings and grounds and a few may engage in criminal activity. So, regardless of time, day or night, no matter where you are on campus, be alert, aware of your surroundings and use common-sense safety precautions.
- 4. The building, its facilities and landscaping are maintained in a manner that minimizes hazardous conditions. Traffic signs have been installed in the building grounds and parking area to regulate entrance, parking, and exit of vehicles within the school's area of responsibility.
- 5. Parking attendants are also tasked to conduct rounds to check the vehicles parked on campus grounds and report suspicious persons to campus security personnel.
- 6. When you park, please lock your vehicle, turn the auto alarm, or consider using a steering wheel locking device. For bicycles, make sure that they are locked, even if you will be gone only a few minutes, and secure it to the bike rack.

7. If you are out at night on campus or walking to campus parking lots, we strongly encourage you to have a fellow student, faculty or staff; or you may request the campus security personnel for assistance.

WEAPONS ON CAMPUS

- 1. The state law of California and CALUMS policies and regulations prohibit the possession or use of weapons in the campus. It is a felony punishable by up to four (4) years in prison to possess any firearm within the campus, whether in a book bag, in the car, or in an office, classroom, or apartment. Possessing a concealed weapon or automatic weapons of any kind is illegal, whether on campus or in the community. Campus policies prohibit bringing campus weapons such as knives with blades longer than 2-1/2 inches, switchblades, dirks, daggers, stun guns, BB-gun, air guns, metal knuckles, nun chaku, and other weapons of similar nature.
- 2. If you see a gun or other weapon in the campus, please call the Anaheim Police Department immediately at 714-765-1900 with a description of the location of the weapon and/or the individual carrying it. If you believe that the weapon is being or is about to be used, dial 9-1-1.

COLLECTION OF CRIME STATISTICS

The CALUMS Administration Office is responsible for collecting statistics, identifying reportable crimes, reporting crimes to the FBI and the U.S. Department of Education, and publishing statistics to the public. Under law, these statistics must be reported in the categories specified by each agency. FBI statistics include ONLY crimes occurring on the campus that are reported to police. The Clery Act requires reports from a wider geographic area (e.g. adjacent public property and off-campus student organization property); from a broader scope of "reporters" (e.g., "campus security authorities" having "significant responsibility for student and campus activities," including deans, athletic coaches, student housing and student judicial staff, and advisors to student organizations); for disciplinary referrals as well as arrests for drug, alcohol, and weapons violations; and for different crimes (e.g. forcible sexual assault vs. rape and attempted rape).
